You must demonstrate awareness of each text as a product of its genre (the five language genres). This means that you should either identify devices used by the writer or else employ these devices in your writing.
E.g. Informal letter

Genre = narrative use of language
Use narrative devices such as informal tone, personal pronouns, anecdote, opinion, reported speech
E.g.

Poetry essay
Genre = language of argument
In your writing, use rhetorical devices such as: opinion, reference/example, personal viewpoint Within the essay, analyse and comment on the devices employed by the poet (poetry = aesthetic use of language). Devices include simile, imagery, assonance, symbolism, enjambment etc.
