SECTION A: Grammar Awareness (10 marks)

This question will ask to you to read sentences, correcting one error in each.

Revise the following key grammar concepts:

- **Parts of Speech:** Nouns, Verbs, Adjectives, Adverbs, Conjunctions, Pronouns, Prepositions.
- Sentence Structure: Simple, Compound, and Complex sentences.
- **Punctuation:** Commas, Apostrophes, Full Stops, Quotation Marks, Exclamation Marks.
- Subject-Verb Agreement: Ensuring the subject and verb match in number (singular/plural).
- **Tenses:** Past, Present, and Future, including perfect and continuous forms.
- Common Errors: Their/There/They're, Its/It's, Your/You're.

Practice Questions:

Section 1: Identify the Part of Speech

Identify the part of speech for the underlined word in each sentence.

- 1. She danced gracefully at the party.
- 2. The **dog** chased its tail in circles.
- 3. They will finish their homework before dinner.

Section 2: Correct the Following Sentences for Grammar and Punctuation

Rewrite the sentences correctly, fixing any grammar or punctuation mistakes.

- 1. their going to the cinema tonight aren't they
- 2. She dont like running but she loves swimming
- 3. I went to the shop bought some bread and returned home

Section 3: Rewrite the Sentences in the Correct Tense

- 1. She done her homework.
- 2. He had went to school.
- 3. They had finished their homework before dinner every day.

SECTION B: Drama

Part 1: Unseen Shakespeare Extract

- Practise applying reading strategies to dramatic extracts from Shakespearean plays (can be found on past papers).
- Focus on identifying:
 - Plot: What is happening in the scene?
 - Characters: Who is involved, and what are their motivations?
 - Dramatic Elements:
 - Suspense: How is tension created?
 - Props and Costumes: What might be used to enhance the scene?
 - Lighting: How could it reflect mood or focus attention?
 - Stage Directions: How do movements or gestures add to the scene?

Practice Questions:

- 1. What do we learn about the characters from their dialogue?
- 2. How does Shakespeare create tension or conflict in the extract?
- 3. Explain how props, lighting, or costume could be used effectively in this scene.

Part 2: Studied Drama — The Merchant of Venice

- Focus on key characters: Shylock, Portia, Antonio, Bassanio, Jessica.
- Be able to describe:
 - Their role in the plot
 - Key characteristics and personality traits
 - How they develop throughout the play
 - Important scenes where they reveal their nature

PEA Paragraph Structure:

- Point: Make a clear statement about the character.
- Evidence: Provide a quotation or specific example from the play.
- Analysis: Explain how this example shows their traits or development.

Practice Prompts:

- 1. Write a PEA paragraph on Shylock's role as both villain and victim.
- 2. Describe how Portia demonstrates intelligence and strength in the courtroom scene.
- 3. Analyse Antonio's friendship with Bassanio and how it drives the plot.

SECTION C: Poetry Analysis (PEA Paragraphs)

- Be able to analyse a studied poem focusing on:
 - Themes: What is the main idea or message?
 - **Poetic Techniques:** Simile, Metaphor, Personification, Imagery, Alliteration, Assonance, Enjambment, Rhyme, Rhythm.
 - Tone and Mood: How does the poet create a feeling or atmosphere?
 - Structure: How is the poem organised?

PEA Paragraph Structure:

- Point: State what technique or theme is being used.
- Evidence: Quote a line or phrase from the poem.
- Analysis: Explain its effect on the reader and its importance in the poem.

Practice Prompts:

- 1. Write a PEA paragraph about the use of imagery in a studied poem.
- 2. Discuss how the poet creates mood through their choice of words.
- 3. Analyse the central theme of a poem you have studied and its significance.
