- Homework & Study – Support good study habits by setting aside time and a quiet space for homework each evening.

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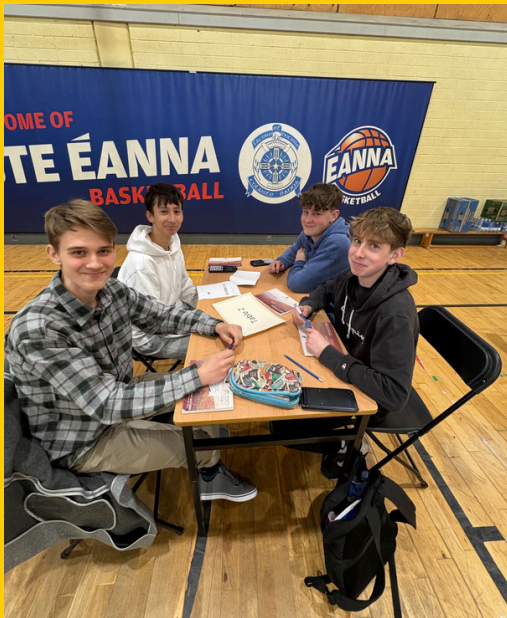


CURRICULAR HIGHLIGHTS

MATHS

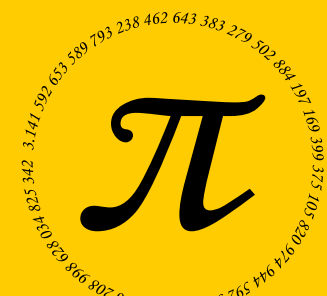


Pi Quiz Table - IMTA

First Years poems

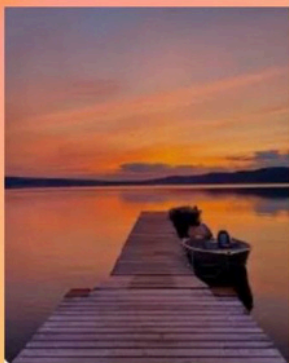

FESTIVAL OF LEARNING

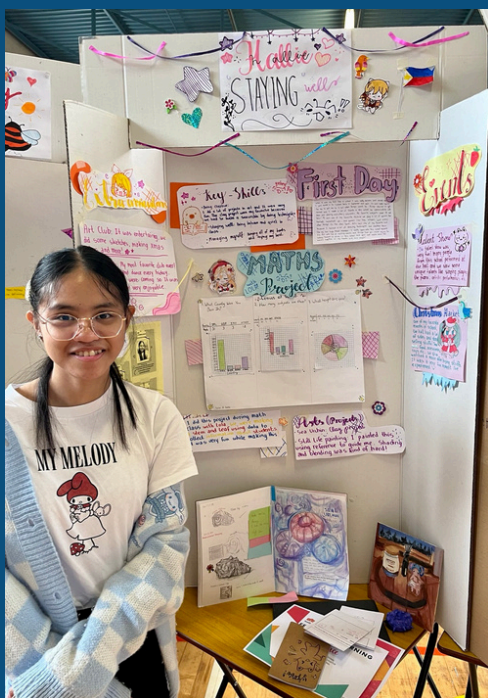
A CELEBRATION OF OUR 1ST YEAR STUDENTS

TRANSITION YEAR

A YEAR OF GROWTH

This has been another exciting term for our Transition Year students, balancing classroom learning with hands-on experiences. Through a variety of workshops, activities, and work placement, they have had the opportunity to develop key skills such as teamwork, problem-solving, creativity, and independence. These experiences have enriched their learning and allowed them to explore new interests in a practical setting.

BARISTA COURSE

The Dublin Barista School's one-day certified allowed students to learn essential barista skills, including espresso preparation, milk texturing, and equipment handling. They learned to craft and present coffee and hot chocolate gaining insight into coffee origins and measurements. The course is followed by access to an online recap module, that they all receive a certificate. Students created a pop up coffee shop for some of our other thirsty students to get a feel for how the pressure can mount in a busy work environment. Everyone was 'buzzing' by the end of the day!

KING LEAR AT THE GATE THEATRE

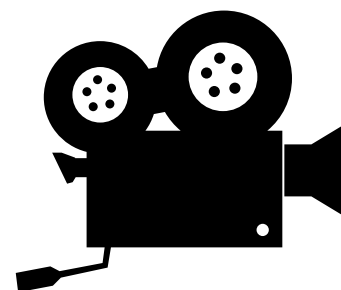

FROM CONCEPTS TO CREATIONS

During the week of 3th-7th of March, our school came alive with curiosity and innovation as we celebrated Spotlight on Engineering Week during Tutor Time. This exciting initiative, designed to promote Whole-School Guidance and raise awareness about the diverse world of engineering, saw students from both Junior and Senior Cycles actively engage in a series of fun and educational activities.

THE WHOLE-SCHOOL ENGINEERING QUIZ

Each morning, students participated in an interactive Whole School Engineering Quiz, testing their knowledge of engineering concepts, famous engineers, and groundbreaking technological advancements.

- **Monday & Tuesday:** Students answered three engineering-related questions each morning, fostering discussion and teamwork within tutor groups.
- **Wednesday:** An extra challenge with four questions, encouraging deeper engagement and critical thinking.
- **Thursday:** A high-energy General Knowledge Engineering Kahoot, bringing a competitive and interactive edge to the week's activities.
- **Friday:** The much-anticipated announcement of winners, with prizes awarded to the top-performing classes.

FOSTERING DISCUSSION AND COLLABORATION

Throughout the week, teachers facilitated engaging conversations using a specially designed PowerPoint presentation. Students explored the role of engineering in everyday life, the various career pathways available, and how problem-solving and creativity drive innovation in this dynamic field.

The Compass

Ships' Compasses have helped sailors navigate for more than 900 years. They are housed in **binnacles** – as a safeguard against what?

Binnacles and Metal



The value of a compass to a sailor is that, using magnetism, it should always point North. But the closer it is to other magnetic metals, the less accurate it will be – so binnacles provide shielding from other metals on the ship.

Before compasses were used for navigation, Chinese astronomers used them to attempt to tell peoples' fortunes. Once their use in navigation became known, compasses were widely used by sailors. And, **300 years ago**, they became particularly useful when engineers developed **marine clocks**.

As all ships had compasses during the Golden Age of Piracy, there was no real need to keep them under lock and key. Pirates were, though, great engineers, maintaining, repairing and improving their ships while on the move – and learning and refining great skills as metalworkers.

Storms at Sea




Although binnacles have nothing to do with surviving storms at sea, this is an area that **nautical engineers** take very seriously. Ships need to stay afloat whether the waves are **rolling** them from side to side, or **pitching** them front front to back. And they also need to be able to withstand the huge forces provided by waves tens of metres high crashing over them.

SISK ENGINEERS VISIT

A glimpse into the future of construction

Students had an exciting opportunity to learn about the world of construction and engineering during a visit from SISK engineers. The talk focused on the redevelopment of the historic Glass Bottle Factory site in Ringsend, which is being transformed into a modern residential quarter.

The Glass Bottle Development

Once home to the Irish Glass Bottle Company, which produced glassware for over a century, the site is now being repurposed into a vibrant new community. The first phase of the development includes three residential blocks with 566 apartments and townhouses, as well as commercial spaces. The second phase will add 324 more apartments, green spaces, and retail areas.

Insights from Industry Experts

The visiting engineers shared their experiences in various roles:

- Laura McPadden, Planner, explained how careful scheduling ensures construction projects stay on track.
- Tom Larkin, Site Engineer, demonstrated how precision and problem-solving are crucial on-site.
- Kane Farrell, BIM Engineer, highlighted how digital modelling enhances efficiency and sustainability in construction.

Did you know...? A Look Back at History

- The Irish Glass Bottle Company was founded in 1871, initially making black porter bottles.
- By the 1980s, it was one of the most advanced glass factories in Europe.
- The factory closed in 2002, marking the end of an era for Ringsend's industrial past.

The visit provided students with a fascinating look at career opportunities in construction, engineering, and planning, as well as a deeper appreciation for Dublin's evolving landscape.

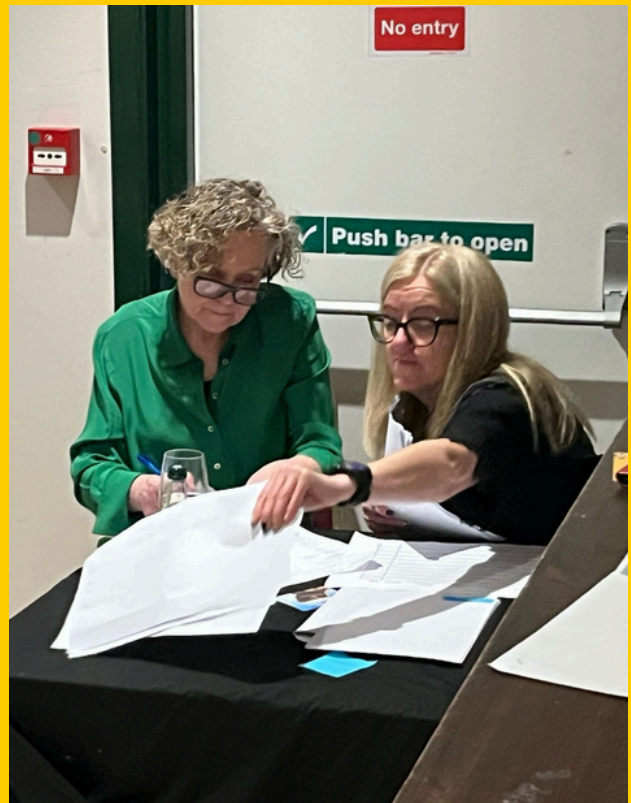
BATTLE OF THE BRAINS

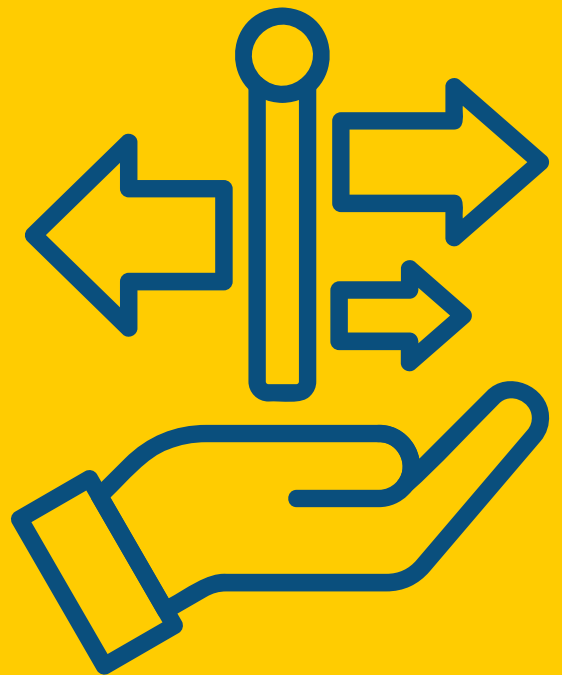

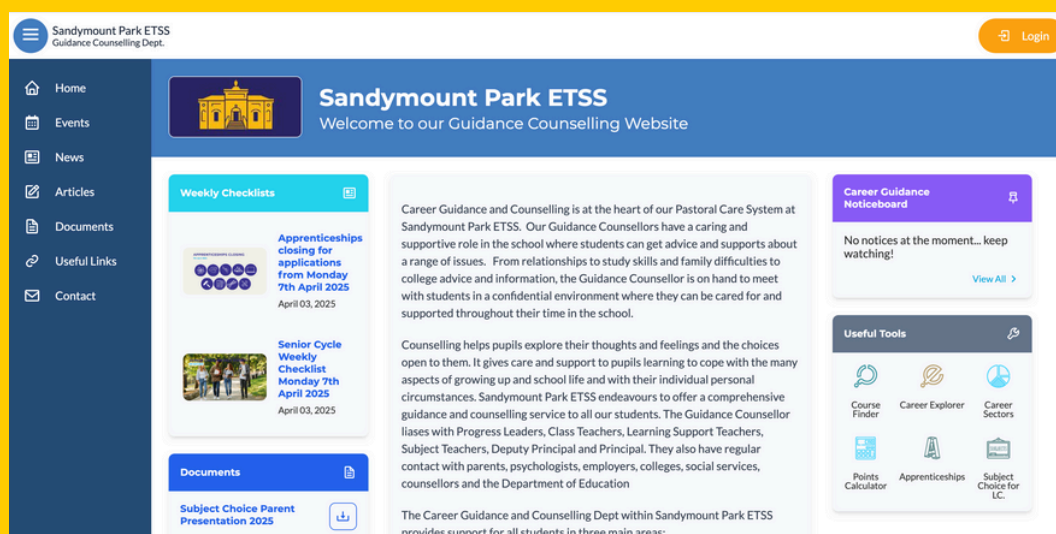
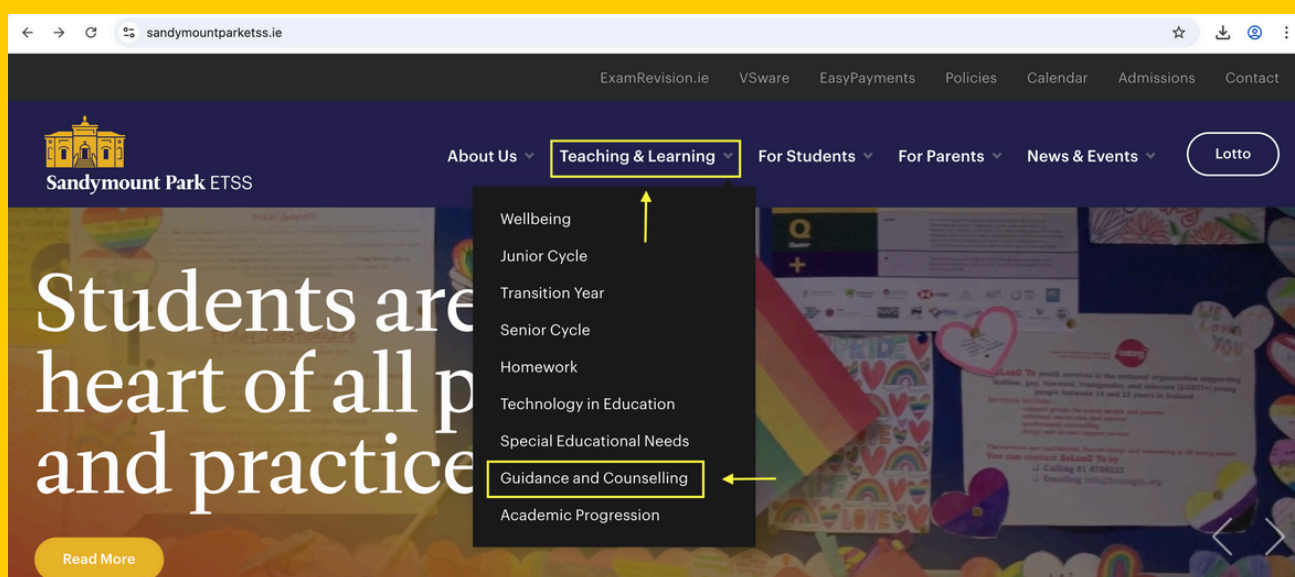
