STEM

SciFest @College

GAELBHRATACH AWARD

We are delighted to say that we have earned our first Gaelbhratach. Gaelbhratach is a scheme that was founded in response to the need to create natural opportunities to speak Irish outside of the classroom and Irish class time. The scheme provides support from Gael Linn and involves schools establishing a committee to promote Irish throughout the whole school community. This year, Sandymount Park ETSS had 9 members on our committee across Transition Year and 5th year, who planned various events such as quizzes, competitions, trips, and created our 'Balla Gaeilge' with our motto, film, music, and tv recommendations, and information about events taking place. We recently attended a presentation ceremony in Mary Immaculate College, Limerick, where we were awarded our flag and where we learned that Sandymount Park ETSS is the first post-primary school in the area to be awarded our Gaelbhratach. Well done to the Irish Department for this milestone.





FINANCIAL LITERACY PROGRAMME

Transition Year students recently participated in a comprehensive financial literacy programme delivered by Irish Funds, the representative body for the funds and asset management industry in Ireland.

Over the course of six weeks, students engaged with professionals from the financial sector, gaining valuable insights into key areas such as digital finance, sustainable investing and portfolio management.

As part of the programme, participants took part in a simulation exercise where they created and managed their own investment portfolios, applying the knowledge and skills they acquired throughout the initiative.

The experience not only enhanced their financial literacy but also helped develop practical life skills, offering a unique opportunity to explore potential career paths in the financial services industry.





LEAVING CERTIFICATE PE

"In LCPE this year, as part of our course, we were learning about the role of a coach. We learned in class about the physical and mental roles of the coach in sport. After completing this topic in class, we applied it to the real world by coaching first years. We split our class into groups of four and took 10 first years each to coach. We did a fun ramp warmup where we did an in depth stretch, raised our heart rate and body temperature and played some games. Once all the first years were warmed up, we played a five aside game. After the match, we had a group discussion with our teams and asked them what they enjoyed about the day and what they think we could improve. The following week in class we discussed the feedback from the first years and applied it to our next lesson plan. This time we brought a speaker and played more upbeat music to motivate them more and encourage them to participate. After we finished our warmup, we played our five a side match again, this time the first years were much more involved and enjoyed it much more. They said the addition of upbeat music made it much more enjoyable.

Our LCPE class enjoyed learning how to coach and applying what we learned in class to the real world. It was enjoyable to get out of the classroom and have a practical class, and it also bettered our understanding of the topic." - Kate




A CELEBRATION OF OUR FIRST YEAR STUDENTS





































BEYOND THE CLASSROOM














GREEN SCHOOLS FLAG AWARD
